## President's Message. Commemoration of 81<sup>st</sup> Anniversary of the Battle of Coral Sea.

Dear members and friends,

Thank you, all those who attended our Battle of the Coral Sea Commemoration Service, held at the Australian American War Memorial, *Lyndon Baynes Johnson Place* Newstead Park, Brisbane, Australia on Saturday 6<sup>th</sup> May 2023. We have now received sincere comment from guests that the service was most appreciated.

180 guests [consisting of 51 Wreath-layers] attended the service to honour and remember those who fought and those who died, in this epic battle [from 4<sup>th</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> May 1942] that saved Australia from invasion.

#### Welcome Address given by Mike Harris, President of the Australian American Association, Brisbane, at the 81<sup>st</sup> Anniversary of the Battle of the Coral Sea, held on Sat 6<sup>th</sup> May 2023, at Newstead Park, Qld Australia.

I am very honoured to join with you in commemorating the 81<sup>st</sup> Anniversary of this most significant Battle that it has been said, saved Australia from invasion! It was fought in waters, as close as 800 kilometres off our beautiful Queensland Coastline and that ladies and gentlemen, is so tremendously close to us here!

This colossal battle, saw warships from the US and Australian Navies, matched together against those of the Imperial Japanese Navy. This battle persisted for 5 tough, hardgruelling days, between the 4th and the 8th May, 1942. It was the first aircraft-carrier battle ever fought, and the first in which the opposing ships never sighted, nor fired directly upon, one another. This was because all of the attacks were made by aircraft, bombing and torpedoing; all desperately vying to destroy each other's ships.

We have on display the 20 photographic plates produced by Paul Johnson, on the table over there. They paint a graphic description and story (plate by plate) of the battle, and reading through them really puts you in touch with the realism and desperation of those who were involved in this epic encounter.

It is also noteworthy that...on the 8<sup>th</sup> May 1942 (almost 81 years ago) was the date of the sinking of the US Fleet-Carrier - USS Lexington, that beautiful ship the 'Lady Lex' as she was most affectionately called, went down with the loss of 216 of her crew and 35 aircraft.

And, most importantly today, we must remember the sacrifice of all those who fought in this battle, and the ultimate sacrifice of those who died. Such is the tragedy of war the fact, that some never get to return home to their families and their friends!

Today, we Australians fervently renew our gratitude to the United States of America for the support it provided during our very desperate time of need, and for the Alliance to which this Battle means so much. In these very different present and challenging times, Australian and American forces continue to uphold the great traditions that were forged, so long ago.

With the passing of time. the Commemoration of this Battle, has become an acknowledge the enduring occasion to significance of Australia's long-term strategic relationship with the United States of America. Particularly now, as both of our Nations face the most difficult and dangerous security environment, experienced in the past 81 years.

We now see the crisis that has developed in Europe, with the Russian invasion of the Ukraine, and as well, there is the broader challenge to world-order and our national security response, focusing on our own Pacific-Region. At the end of the day, our shared prosperity and security, depends directly on our ability to properly defend ourselves in the face of any threat, as we did during our darkest days of World War 2.

So now, on this day of commemoration, we express our thanks to our Australian Defence Force and the Armed Forces of the United States of America.

We will remember, this day, tomorrow and always, those who paid the price for our freedom and there is always a price to be paid, by those who serve.

And, so.....Lest we forget

#### **REMEMBERING THE PRESENCE OF UNITED STATES FORCES IN AUSTRALIA 1941 - 1947.**

A short distance upstream from where the Annual Battle of the Coral Sea Wreath-laying event is held at "Newstead Park" is the site of the old "Newstead Wharves". This is the location where the Heavy Cruiser "USS Pensacola" berthed on 22<sup>nd</sup> of December 1941. It was also the berth in late November 1947 for the Ship "USAT Goucher Victory", a Victory class WW2 Ship, successor to the Liberty class ships. "USAT Goucher Victory" was named after Goucher College, a then all female college with a famous WW2 connection.

<u>The story began</u> with the first presence of US Forces in Australia, when a convoy of 7 cargo and troop ships [known at the "Pensacola Convoy"] was being escorted by the "USS Pensacola", en-route to re-equip the US Base in Manila. However, following the bombing of Pearl harbour by Japanese forces, the convoy was diverted to Brisbane. Along the way, the convoy was joined by an escort of Royal Australian Navy Cruisers – "Canberra" and 'Perth' and the Royal New Zealand Cruiser – "Achilles".

As the "USS Pensacola" and her Convoy, steamed up the Brisbane River, cheering crowds of local people were seen all along the banks of the river, happy to see the arrival of the convoy. The convoy was the first of the military forces (US battalions of men and their military equipment) to arrive from the US on Australian soil. The convoy discharged its men and equipment at a location at Hamilton Wharf - now known as "Pensacola Place" near Brett's Wharf, which is located downstream from Newstead Park.

<u>The story finished</u> 6 years later, as 1,900 coffins were loaded during December 1947. It is especially important as on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of December, six years to the day and watched by 30,000 Brisbane residents, the last American was loaded on the "USAT Goucher Victory" - who was an Unknown American Soldier. That ship a few days later took its sombre cargo back to Guam to be transferred to another Victory ship with the final resting place of its cargo, being new at that time, the National Punchbowl War Cemetery.



A ceremony was held in the Brisbane City Hall on 22nd December 1947 to honour the American dead. A coffin containing the body of an Unknown American Soldier was paraded ceremoniously through Brisbane City "King George Square" where the cortege stopped in front of City Hall and wreaths were laid.



The Cortege then moved to "Newstead Wharves" where Taps were sounded and 3 rifle volleys fired.
