Our Eldest Nonagenarians Our World War II Treasures

Fay Royle

Doris Fay Gosden was born in 1926 in Adelaide. She enlisted in the Women's Royal Australian Navy Service as a Teleprinter Operator (Group III) and was assigned to HMAS Moreton. She also served at HMAS Magnetic and was 'discharged engagement expired' (D.E.E) from HMAS Torrens in March 1946.

Fay was in the WRANS for a few weeks when Margaret Hall (a Wran serving at HMAS Moreton at the time), passed away. Fay and other Wrans practised marching to be part of the military funeral in the city for her.



In 1949, Fay married William Gordon Woodforth Royle and made their home in Kalinga. He passed away in May 2009.

Fay came from a service family. Her father was a Captain and served in the Army from 1942-1946. Her sister, Joy Gosden (Seeney), served in the WRANS from 1943-1946.

Fay was drafted to HMAS Magnetic, Townsville and was re-united with her sister, Joy. They both thought this was great, but the Navy had other ideas. Joy was posted to HMAS Leeuwin (Perth). Fay was still able to enjoy her time in Townsville, even getting a plane ride (or 'spin' as Fay puts it) over Magnetic Island. Fay and her sister were finally discharged (demobbed) at the same time. Both sisters worked in Melbourne for a time before returning home.

Lillian Coyne

Lillian Murial Davis was born at Tannalo, via Mackay in 1926. She enlisted in the Women's Royal Australian Navy Service on 3 April 1945. She was enlisted as an Assistant Writer (Group III) and was allocated to HMAS Moreton. She was rated Writer (Minor) Group II on 3 July 1945. She was discharged from the WRANS on 28 June 1946 and settled in Bauple.

After her discharge, Lillian married Frederick George Brooks, who served in the Army as a gunner during the war. Fred passed away in 1978. Lillian married Joseph Anthony Coyne in July 1980. Joseph passed away in June 2005.

Lillian was a member of the Brisbane Sub-Section in 1959 and joined the WRANS Sub-Section on 30 July 1964 until 1985. She rejoined the Sub-Section in February 1988 until 2000. She is now a Golden Member of the Sub-Section.

Lillian is also an author of several books that are available at the Bauple Museum, which she helped to establish in her family home.

Murielle Ahern

Murielle Agnes McGrath was born at Boonah in 1925. She enlisted in the Women's Royal Australian Navy Service in April 1945 as a Telephone (Group IV) and was allocated to HMAS Moreton and then transferred to

HMAS Penguin in April 1945. She returned to HMAS Moreton in August 1946. Murielle was discharged (D.E.E) in September 1946.

In August 1952, Murielle re-enlisted in the WRANS as a Recruit Wran Writer (Probation) and was discharged "Free" in September 1952. >>

Murielle married Maurice James Ahern who passed away in November 1975.

In January 1958, under the Animal Diseases and Control Ordinance, Murielle was appointed as Stock Inspector, dated at Port Moresby the tenth day of January 1958 by Chief Stock Inspector.

Murielle has the Australian Service Medal 1939-1945 and the G BR Georges VI. Murielle joined the Sub-Section in May 1993.

Post War Treasure

Jenny Bell

Mavis Jean Robinson was born at Rose Park in September 1930. Mavis (known as Jenny) enlisted in the Women's Royal Australian Navy Service in September 1952. Prior to joining the WRANS, Jenny was a Typist and enlisted as a Telegraphist. In March 1953, Jenny was rated as A/WRAN TEL at HMAS Harman. In May 1953, Jenny was posted to HMAS Harman, then to HMAS Lonsdale in October 1953. Jenny was discharged on marriage, from HMAS Lonsdale.

Jenny married Kenneth John Bell. Kenneth served in the RAN from July 1952 and was discharged in July 1958.

Jenny joined the Sub-Section in September 1981 and has remained a continuous full member.

Summary

These are the four eldest members of our Sub-Section. We have six Nonagenarians and 22 Octogenarians - we wish them all well and look forward to seeing them at our events.

Victory in the Pacific

On the morning of 15 August 1945, the Emperor of Japan announced that Japan would accept the Allies ultimatum to surrender.

For Australians, this meant the end of the Second World War. A war that had seen nearly 1 million Australians serve in the armed forces. Of those, over 30,000 Australians were taken prisoner and 39,000 did not return to their loved ones. A legacy which is still felt today.

78 years later, on 15 August 2023 we remembered and respect all those Australians that served during the Second World War; those who gave the ultimate sacrifice; those who returned and were forever scarred; and those who cared for our veterans.

Introduction to Executives

Judy Prewett (Secretary)

I grew up in a small farming community in Mumbil a small town in Central Western New South Wales.

Horse riding, basketball, cricket, tennis and netball were my interests.

On completing High School at Wellington High in 1969 work was very scarce so in late 1970 I moved to Gosford NSW on the Central Coast and started working in a local Pharmacy. Whilst in Gosford, I boarded with an amazing family and continued with my sport playing tennis and hockey. I joined ROTARACT as a founding member and friendships from that time continue today.

In July 1972 I decided to follow my dream and applied to join the Navy. I was accepted and boarded a train from Central Station in Sydney for HMAS Cerberus arriving on Melbourne Cup Day November 1972. I was greeted by none other than the great Lennie Maiden, making it known she was missing the Melbourne Cup because of our arrival.

After recruit training I was accepted to train as an ROM/ROS so in February 1973 I boarded a train again this time to Canberra to join HMAS Harman. After completing my training in August 1973, I was posted to Darwin so this time I boarded a TAA plane and posted into HMAS Coonawarra.

Life was pretty good in the Top End, and I continued with my tennis and basketball whilst creating memories of great times with friends I am still in contact with 50 + years later. Cyclone Tracy wreaked havoc on us Xmas 1974 and wiped out the receiving station. I was one of the first crews to work at Shoal Bay Receiving station which was being built at the time. With no walls and equipment not yet fitted we started work under hazardous conditions sharing with many forms of wildlife, the main being the snake population.

Along this journey, I married my Sailor boy in 1974, survived Cyclone Tracey and had 2 beautiful children. I went on maternity leave in January 1976 pending the arrival of our beautiful daughter Taira (dec) and 3½ years later in 1979 our amazing son Trent arrived. I discharged in June 1976 due to lack of postings and no childcare.

In 1983 I re-joined the workforce returning to Pharmacy. Nowra, Canberra and Alice Springs were the towns I called home. In 1996, my husband Max had the opportunity to join Pine Gap in Alice Springs so once again the family packed up and continued our adventure.

I was lucky enough to win a manager position at one of the local Pharmacies where I stayed until retirement in January 2016.

The family relocated to Ningi in February 2016 where we continue to enjoy the laid-back lifestyle.

I reconnected with Navy Women late 2016 and became a member. I was Assistant Secretary for a number of years, and I am now Secretary of NWQld and Treasurer of Council of Ex Servicewomen (CESWA), as well as Stores Officer.

Along the way I had the privilege of Co-ordinating Navy Women's National Reunion in Brisbane in October 2022. An amazing journey that continues.

Bernie Franklin (Vice President)

I was born in Longreach in 1953. After I completed my education at Year 10, at the age of 15 years, I found my first job in a ball-bearing company in Geebung. A year later I joined the Queensland Public Service as a typist/administrative assistant with the Department of Education, Australian Music Examinations Board.

Being the second eldest of nine children, I couldn't wait to leave home and join the Navy. I wanted to do more with my life than just bathe, feed, clothe etc the younger siblings.

Having determined to join the Navy at the age of 13 after watching a television movie about the American WAVES, I joined the WRANS in Brisbane on 7 January 1971. While my preferred category choices were either Writer or Communicator, I elected for the option of Sick Berth Attendant (SBA) because I was able to be recruited within three months. I later tried to change category to Writer, but it was not approved.

As an SBA, I served in HMAS Cerberus for a year; HMAS Penguin for a further year; and then HMAS Coonawarra from 1973 until 1975. I discharged (D.E.E) in Coonawarra as a LWRSBA on 6 January 1975.

I married a sailor in April 1974 and as both of our terms of enlistment expired in January 1975, we both decided to leave the Navy and remain in Darwin. Unfortunately, Cyclone Tracy hit Darwin while we were on leave awaiting discharge.

With the emergency situation in Darwin, I was able to walk into a Commonwealth Public Service position in the Department of the Northern Territory. I remained in the same Department for 23 years before moving to Rockhampton where I worked with Central Queensland University for seven years before retirement.

We had two children – a daughter Rebecca born one year and three days post Cyclone Tracy and a son Michael born six years later in 1981. The gap of six years was caused by the difficulty in having our home built, along with the rest of Darwin, at that time.

I look back on my career in the WRANS as being a time which taught me the importance of discipline in all aspects of my life. I learnt how to be responsible for my decisions and mistakes.

I value my continuing connection with the NAA because I can be myself with like-minded women and importantly, continue the long-term friendships and camaraderie.

I transferred from the Capricornia Sub-Section on 8 May 2016, which I joined on 22 August 2004. I was the Treasurer of Capricornia in 2009.

I received my 15 years Long Service Certificate on 22 August 2019.

I have been our Vice President since 2022.

Remembering Greenwich House

I know that there are many former WRANS in Navy Women (Qld) who served at HMAS Lonsdale over the years and who would have many fond memories of Greenwich House, that stately mansion at 77 Irving Road, Toorak, Victoria. It was those memories that prompted Lynn Baker to research its background through the Victorian Heritage Data Base Register and share some of her findings with me. I hope you find them interesting.

Greenwich House (originally Lorimer House) is a large Toorak mansion built in 1869 for the merchant and politician James Lorimer, probably to the design of the architect Leonard Terry. The two-storey house is an Italianate style bay-fronted mansion of eighteen rooms, notable for the central Roman Doric portico and restrained ornamentation.

Greenwich House is of historical significance as one of the oldest surviving Toorak residences. The house was one of the first built on the early close sub-divisions in the Toorak district, at a time when the area was becoming keenly sought after as a site for residences of the wealthy. Its original owner, James Lorimer, moved from the house in 1876 as his growing status demanded a more substantial residence. Subsequent owners made their own alterations, expanding the house with additions such as a ballroom, extended servants' quarters, and more bedrooms.

By the 1920s its years as a family residence were numbered. Like many of Melbourne's mansion houses, Greenwich House underwent many changes of use in the 20th century, reflecting changing social and economic conditions. Much of its original grounds were subdivided and built upon, the house itself was converted to flats and then to hostel accommodation for the Navy, before becoming the Chinese consulate in the 1980s.

Greenwich House has been associated with several important individuals and families, emphasising the desirability of both the house and the area in which it was located. James Lorimer (1831-1889), its first owner, was a prominent contributor to public life from the 1860s to his death in 1889. He was a prosperous merchant and foundation commissioner of the Melbourne Harbour Trust (Lorimer Street in Port Melbourne commemorates his contribution to the development of Melbourne's port) as well as a noted banker and politician in the 1860s.

Other notable owners or lessees of the house included the Austin family, prominent pastoralists, and the theatre

director Frank Thring who leased the house to entertain actors and other theatre people. Although Greenwich House has been altered over the years, its basic early 20th century form remains intact as an excellent illustration of the lifestyles of Melbourne's business and political elite.

Support for access to MyService via Internet Explorer will cease from 3 June 2023, impacting DVA clients. This change means MyService will no longer operate if clients attempt to access the platform using an Internet Explorer browser.

Clients who currently use Internet Explorer will need to switch to an alternative browser. There are many available– some of the more common ones are Microsoft Edge, Google Chrome, Apple Safari, Firefox, Mozilla, and Opera.

Microsoft Edge is the official replacement for Internet Explorer.

You must switch to a different browser to continue to access MyService, but there is no obligation to use Edge. You can use an alternative browser if you prefer. All are free to download from the internet – just search for them and follow the instructions to download the most recent version.

It is important to keep up to date with upgrades and improvements to the software you use to maintain protection against security vulnerabilities.

MyService can also be accessed from your mobile device, and is now directly linked through the new myGov app.

If you continue to experience issues with accessing MyService once you have switched browsers, please try restarting your browser, and if the problem is not resolved you can contact 1800 VETERAN (1800 838 372) for guidance.

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Australian Coastwatcher Memorial Service in Brisbane

Second World War Coastwatchers were commemorated at the monthly Naval Association of Australia ceremony at the Jack Tar statue at South Brisbane Memorial Park (next to the Ship Inn) at 10.30am on Thursday 27 July.

Descendants of legendary decorated Coastwatchers Paul Mason DSC and Bill Bennett MM attended along with representatives from the United States, Solomon Islands, New Guinea and Chinese communities.

Coastwatchers rescued 75 prisoners of war, 321 shot-down Allied airmen, 280 shipwrecked naval personnel, 190 missionaries and other civilians, uncounted Islanders and 260 Asian people who had put their own lives into danger.

Apart from their intelligencegathering duties, Coastwatchers also rescued stranded Allied sailors and airmen including future U.S. Presi-

dent John F Kennedy after his patrol torpedo boat, PT-109, was sunk by a Japanese destroyer. President Kennedy's daughter Caroline who is now the Ambassador of the United States in Australia participated in the ceremony.

A memorial in Madang in Papua New Guinea that's dedicated to the 36 Australian Coastwatchers killed in the line of duty says: 'They watched and warned and died that we might live'.

The QLD Section President Helen Yentch opened her address at the memorial servce as follows:

"Today we have three or more women have something in common. Rosemary and Elizabeth Gill whose father served his country as a Coastwatch-



er in the Pacific War; Betty Lee, Susan Peatfield and Alison Early - three relatives of Eric Feldt another Coastwatcher who we honoured last year and last but no means least, Ambassador Caroline Ken-

> nedy whose father served his country and was rescue by a Coastwatcher in that war"

> Coastwatcher Lieutenant Reg Evans DSC RANR witnessed the aftermath of the collision of PT 109 with a Japanese destroyer from his hideaway on Kolombangara Island and reported the collision. The next day he was informed of the loss of PT109 with a crew of 12 in Blacket Strait, Evan's scouts found no trace of survivors the next day.

> After several days Evans found one of his scouts awaiting him with the news that men were on an island between Gizo and Ferguson Passage who turned out to Lieutenant John Kennedy and the survivors of

his crew. The scouts showed Kenndy how to carve a message on a coconut. Later Kennedy an the survivors of his were picked up and returned to Rendova.

On election to Presidency of the USA, Kennedy received a congratulatory message from Evans and Evans was invited to the US where he met with Kennedy and the PT109 veterans in the White House. A replica of the "Message on a coconut" was presented to the QLD Section by Ambassador Caroline Kennedy at the end of the Commemoration Service. In return, the Ambassador was presented with a NAA historical book and an NAA 100 year badge which she pinned on her collar before her departure

It was January 1971 when 3 fresh faced 17 year olds met at HMAS Cerberus, all part of Recruit Class 123. They were Christine Fraser from Victoria, Helen McCarthy from New South Wales and Bernadette Tom from Queensland, all RWRSBA's. Fast forward 52 years to June 2023 and Christine Clifford, Helen Hislop and Bernie Franklin, all now turning 70, decided to celebrate this milestone.

We all flew to Cairns, met up at the airport on 17 June and spent four days there. Christine travelled from Victoria, Helen and Bernie from Queensland. We did the touristy thing on day 1 and drove a loop visiting such places as Edmonton, Gordonvale, Yungaburra, Atherton, Herberton etc. Day 2 we caught the Skyrail to Kuranda and spent the day. We did not realise that Mondays and Tuesdays are regarded as Kuranda's weekend so it was very quiet, which suited us perfectly. We consider ourselves of an age where crowds are not our thing anymore. Day 3 was very quiet and we spent the day discovering Cairns. Personally, I was very surprised at the change in Cairns since I was last there. A lot of development has taken place. Christine and I did catch up with Choppy Visini (Ahmat) who now resides there and is very involved as a mentor to an Indigenous program for entry into the armed forces.

Dav 4 was Wednesday. 21 June - Christine's 70th birthday - and we were boarding the Spirit of Queensland at 8.35am for a 25 hour train trip back to Brisbane. But we were doing it in style. We chose to travel in a carriage that had sitters that converted to



sleeping pods, all meals provided, a choice of drink for lunch and dinner, a TV monitor for your choice of movie, TV programs or music and had your "bed" made up and converted back to your sitter the next morning. Very sophisticated and comfortable (somewhat). That night was the night of the second State of Origin but as there was no free to air TV on the train, I had to rely on a gentleman in the pod in front of me watching on his device. He was a very excited Queenslander who was told by his wife to "shut up John" more than once. This win provided a lot of fun throughout the carriage as one of the staff was a New South Welsh man.

We had a reasonably good night's sleep but the train arriving and departing stations along the Coastal route tended to make you stir as did the "swoosh" of the carriage doors opening and closing as passengers visited the amenities. We lost over an hour overnight because of wandering cattle along the train tracks.

Christine and I departed the train at Caboolture but Helen travelled on to the end of the line at Brisbane. We are all so pleased that we chose to do this and we had a fabulous time and would recommend it as a real experience. And mostly, you are only ever going to do it once, so do it in style.
