Marburg's Tourist Attraction

A couple of months ago I had the pleasure of joining the Logan/Beenleigh Retired Police Association on a bus trip to the interesting town of Marburg. Like all tourists I couldn't go past Marburg's Street Library Reading Room. I just loved it, so, I naturally took a photo and googled it when I got home.

So, where did it come from?

A sprawling street library and somewhat unusual reading room have popped up out the front of the green shed in the centre of town.

A tin outhouse has been built to serve as reading room and is already proving popular with the locals.

It should be noted however, that it is not a functioning toilet.

When the Children's Book Council of Australia (Qld branch) called for expressions of interest for one lucky member across the state to be the recipient of a street library donated by Street Library Australia, Ipswich Libraries was quick to jump to action.



The Marburg Residents Association jumped on board after the street library was received and decided to make two more to compliment the first.

Councillor Russell Milligan said that this initiative was a great way to bring books to rural areas as

"The Marburg Residents Association have shown real enthusiasm for having this street library in their community," Cr Milligan said. "Not only did they embrace the idea but they built on it to put their own unique country stamp on it by adding additional libraries and reading room."

Councillor Kate Kunzelmann said it was a wonderful innovation to be able to use the service provided by the community for the community. One box is dedicated to children's books, a second for non-fiction and a third for fiction titles.

Toilets have often been called 'reading rooms' and the Marburg community has a great sense of humour.

"I congratulate the local residents and artists who have spent a lot of voluntary time to put this street library together," Cr Kunzelmann said. "This is a grass roots initiative free

from bureaucracy and for people who love books it's a great way to be able to access them.

"The street library has been placed in the centre of town in the park where families and groups regularly gather under historic tall trees.

Marburg Residents Association secretary Wendye Gratton said the idea for the interesting reading room came from her husband Barry. He thought it would be a bit of fun to make a reading room alongside the street library to encourage people to stop by and have a read," Mrs Gratton said.

"The idea of the dunny was because in the olden days, you might take your newspaper or something to read and be there for a while. "Our son Rob made it from scratch according to Barry's design and the corrugated iron was donated from Les Birnie's Scotland Yard Antiques shop.

"We also had another resident lay pavers and two local artists, Michelle Howarth and Tanya Weier did the artwork." Mrs Gratton said it's already becoming a bit of a tourist destination with people stopping to be photographed reading in the outhouse reading room and posting to social media.

"It's a bit quirky and different from a traditional library and reading room," Mrs Gratton said.

W6257 Leading Aircraftwoman Kathleen Winifred Pearson

On 14 June 1954, an airwoman was standing before an open fire in the Women's Royal Australian Air Force Recreation Room at No 1 Stores Depot, Tottenham, Victoria, when her clothing caught fire. As she ran towards the door, Leading Aircraftwoman Pearson, the only other occupant of the room at that time, caught her and attempted to smother the flames. The victim, panic-stricken, broke free, but LACW Pearson caught her and, after a brief struggle, forced her to the floor and rolled her in a carpet. Having smothered the flames, she then ran for assistance. During her courageous efforts to extinguish the flames, LACW Pearson herself suffered second degree burns and ran great risk of igniting her own clothing. There is no doubt that the presence of mind and prompt and gallant action of the Leading Aircraftwoman were responsible for saving the life of her companion who is now slowly recovering from serious and extensive burns.

B.E.M. Award to Aircraftwoman


CANBERRA. January 25. The first decoration to be awarded a post-war member of the Women's Royal Australian Air Force was announced today.

The award or the British Empire Medal has been made to LACW Kathleen Winifred Pearson, of New town, Tasmania, at present stationed at No. 3 aircraft depot, Amberley, Queensland.

The Acting Minister for Air (Mr H. E. Holt), who announced the award, said that her action in rescuing another woman from serious injury or possible death. LACW Pearson, in her rescue effort, suffered serious burns herself, he added.

Each year our Association Newsletter advertises the Wondai Reserve Forces Day Recognition Ceremony. And each year I plan to attend this event. Unfortunately, July is a very busy month for memorial events as well as our own Management and General meetings, as a result, once again, this event has been moved to "My To Do List", 2024.

This year, having once again failed to attend this event, I decided, the least I could do to support this 'Recognition Day' is to include this year's speech by Federal Member for Flyn, Mr Colin Boyce MP, to encourage both you and I to make the 2024's event.

Wondai Reserve Forces Day Recognition Ceremony

2 July 2023

Federal Member for Flynn, Mr Colin Boyce MP; South Burnett Regional Council, Mayor, Councillor Brett Otto and Councillors; Commander Ronald Forbes RAN (Ret'd); our MC today, Captain Walter Knight (Retd); Padre, Mr John Cheyne; representatives of the Australian Defence Forces; members of the Reserve Forces Day Committee and Wondai RSL Sub-Branch; distinguished guests; ladies and gentlemen.

I begin by acknowledging the Traditional Owners of the lands of the South Burnett region, the Wakka Wakka and Wulli Wulli people1, and pay my respects to Elders past, present and emerging, and to all First Nations people here today.

I made my first visit to the South Burnett region only last month for Nanango's Pioneer Festival, and I'm very pleased to have the opportunity to return today, to be part of Wondai's annual celebration of Reserve Forces Day.

There have been Reservists in Australia since Federation, and ever since, have played a vital role in the defence of Australia and in supporting peacekeeping, humanitarian and disaster-relief operations both around the world and here at home.

The wreath-laying and Parade this morning, together with this Recognition Ceremony, all acknowledge the service and sacrifice of the millions of men and women who have served in the Army, Airforce and Navy reserves for over 120 years.

These ceremonies also celebrate this community's proud historic ties to World War II when twenty thousand troops were based here. It is now 25 years since the first Reserve Forces Day parades were held in Australia as a way of raising awareness of the Reserves, encouraging enlistment, and thanking employers for their support.

Here in Wondai, the Parade and other ceremonies have been proudly maintained by the South Burnett Reserve Forces Day Committee for the past 18 years and I thank them for their dedication to ensuring that they continue.

As the Patron of QCWA Queensland, I also congratulate the members of the QCWA Wondai Branch. By providing refreshments through their coffee stall today, they are commemorating one of the great community responses to the wars of the 20th century – the Australian Comforts Fund.

The Fund enabled 12 million mugs of tea to be supplied to soldiers in the trenches in World War I, and CWA members here in Wondai were among the thousands of mothers, sisters, wives and daughters who sewed and knitted countless garments to be shipped to

European battlefields in World War II to keep Australian soldiers safe and warm.

Today's celebration is a great community legacy and I thank you all for your commitment to keeping these important traditions alive.

The Maryborough Military Aviation Museum Association is pursuing its mission to preserve the rich aviation heritage of the region by building a world-class museum complex at Maryborough Airport.



As part of its fundraising efforts, a social event was held on Saturday 9
September, with special guest speaker RAAF representative Air Vice-Marshal David Dunlop (rtd) sharing stories from Maryborough's aviation history.

Everyone was welcome at the special walk back in history, set against the backdrop of Gatakers Creative Space, at 311 Kent Street Maryborough.

Earlier on the same day, Saturday 9
September, starting at 2:30pm, a
special unveiling ceremony was held at
the Maryborough War Memorial and
Cenotaph as a tribute to those who
have served their country.

Supported by the DVA Saluting Their Service Grant Program, two bronze plaques had been installed at the War Memorial and Cenotaph. One of the plaques will pay homage to the RAAF Station that operated from the Maryborough Airport during the pivotal period of World War II. This tribute extends to all the individuals who donned the RAAF uniform, especially commemorating the 3,143 members who tragically lost their lives in service during the RAAF's first century, and whose final resting places remain unknown.

The second plaque serves as a reminder of the invaluable contributions made by Australian women in RAAF and RAN Medical Services. Their service during World War II, Korea, Malaya, and Vietnam will be celebrated, alongside a broader recognition of medical personnel from the Australian Army, Air Force, and Navy who selflessly served in various theatres of war.

Following the unveiling ceremony, a complimentary guided tour of the Gallipoli to Armistice Memorial provided a deeper understanding of the sacrifices made by those who served.

Building a museum

The Maryborough Military Aviation Museum Association Inc is a not-for-profit community organisation formed to develop a military aviation museum complex at the Maryborough Airport.

The museum collection is continually growing, and has over 300 items including a Wackett and Tiger Moth aircraft that are being restored to serve as static displays.

Now at the construction stage, the museum will commemorate the considerable RAAF service in Maryborough during World War II, in particular No. 3 WAGS.
