


Dr Lilian Cooper, Josephine Bedford, Dr Agnes Bennett Forgotten Women that defied conventions and left an indelible mark on history ...



Recently I attended a beautiful enlightening musical *A Girls Guide to World War* that was performed at QPAC Brisbane. This portrayed the war time experiences of two female doctors, Dr Lilian Cooper (first female doctor registered in Queensland) from Brisbane and Dr Agnes Bennett from Sydney. Dr Cooper was accompanied by her companion Josephine Bedford who was also a trailblazer in Queensland; one of her triumphs was establishing the Creche and Kindergarten Association (C&K). The exceptional war time experiences of these ladies is a little, but significant part of their lives. They were involved in many things that paved the way not only for females but for the greater good of us all. These were not the only Australian ladies serving on the Serbian Front, in the April 2025 edition of Vetaffairs there is a full-page article on a number of other Australian doctors and nurses etc. that served on the front and have recently been honoured by

the issuing of Serbian Stamps. It's amazing how once you come across a snippet of a story how much information is out there and, in this case, as I started researching, a plethora of information flowed forward.

When WWI broke out in 1914, these ladies offered their service to the AIF but were rejected, as females were not being accepted by the army, only nurses were allowed to enlist. In fact they were rejected due to "the disability of gender" but they were never going to stay home and knit socks. They were not going to take no for an answer. They had heard of the "Scottish Women's Hospitals" (SWH) which was being staffed and funded by women from all over the world. They joined this organisation. Several of these hospitals served in various war-torn countries, but only ONE actually managed to serve on a frontline, it became known as the "Bennett Unit". Our Dr Bennett was its Commanding Officer. Serbia was in desperate need of medical support and accepted the help of this hospital in 1916 becoming the only one of SWH to serve on the frontline. Over 1300 women (doctors, nurses, laboratory technicians, x-ray operators, orderlies, administrators, drivers, cooks etc.) served in Dr Elsie Inglis's 14 medical units throughout the war in France, Russia, Greece, Corsica, Malta, Romania, Salonika and Serbia.

The musical gives an excellent reflection of their time at war. Whilst the Bennett Unit was on the frontline there were other Army Hospitals a day's drive away in Greece, they were right in the thick of it, within earshot of the guns and under constant air raid threat. The hospital was so successful, and Drs Bennett and Cooper had built such a reputation that doctors from other units would come to learn from them. Things that we take as simple good practice today were not around at the time. Dr Bennett introduced many practices that enhanced the survivability of the wounded once they reached her unit. Just simple things like being washed and cleaned on arrival made a significant difference. Many wounded once they knew they were being evacuated to a hospital requested to be sent to the Bennett Unit, they even escaped other hospitals and made their way to hers hoping to sneak in.







Transport in the Serbian Army was limited to stretcher bearers, carts, and mules. The Bennett Unit had the only cars on the front, being the Model T Fords. Josephine was put in charge of the transport section of the unit, her ability to keep the vehicles serviceable, where spare parts were virtually impossible to come by, earnt her the nickname "Miss Spare Parts" from the female drivers. Many of the drivers were "upper class" British women who mucked in and did whatever was asked of them, all the way down to just boiling water and digging holes. It could be suggested that these ladies would have made great diggers as not only did they work hard, but they were a wild lot to manage and made the most of the time. The treacherous roads up to the dressing stations near the front were extremely steep and zigzagged with sharp hair pin bends down the precipitous slopes. Josephine noted that many drivers returned at night with icicles round their necks and their eyebrows frozen. These women not only drove but were often found digging the ambulances out of the mud and snow, pushing them up the hills, washing down their motors and repairing broken parts.

Because of the difficulty of keeping the hospital near the action as the frontline moved forward, and the conditions of the road, sometimes there were delays of up to nine days getting a wounded soldier from the front to the hospital. Dr Bennett proposed a small very simple dressing station be established near the frontline. Dr Cooper was considered the best choice of surgeon to man this forward outpost. 'They had built a nice little mess house of kerosene tins filled with

soil and a tarpaulin roof put up very neatly and were building a place to store things in – the kitchenette was made of stones one on top of another and the roof a hammered out cartridge cases they had brought down from the trenches ... I went out for a walk over the hills with Dr Cooper. Signs of fighting everywhere even some of the dead not properly buried.'



For Lilian, the opportunity to offer her expertise to such a worthy cause, and be able to perform such vital surgeries, was vindication for all the opposition she had faced during her training and early career. Her long hours of life-saving operations, removing bullets and shrapnel, amputating limbs and repairing wounds, stabilised patients enough for transport down to the hospital at Ostrovo. 'The bomb wounds, in my experience, were the worst, so many of them developed gas gangrene, and were most difficult to do anything with.' (Dr Lilian Cooper, 1917 as cited in McLaren, 1919).

The creators of the musical have only been able to present a small snippet of their lives and those who served with them. They suggest that it would take at least a twelve-part TV series to even start to tell some of the stories of the ladies that served in the SWH. For example, the author of "My Brilliant Career" Stella Miles Franklin joined up under a false name "Frankie Doodle" and helped with anything and everything. There are many of these stories to be found and told.

FEMALES MAKE HISTORY AT RMA SANDHURST

On the 11th April 2025 her Royal Highness the Duchess of Edinburgh attended the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst representing His Majesty, The King. This was an historic occasion for a couple of reasons. Whilst RMA Sandhurst has three (3) Sovereigns Parades per year, this was the first time that an all-female banner party had ever been on the Sovereigns Parade. It consisted of a CSM (a nurse with Royal Army Medical Service) carrying the Banner, Escorted by two (2) Staff Sergeants, one from the Royal Army Veterinary Corps and the other a Royal Army Medical Service paramedic. Further history was made because as non-combatants the Royal Army Medical Service do not carry bayonets, however on this occasion the carrying of a fixed bayonet had been specifically approved by the RAMS Corps Colonel and the RSM.

Dr Agnes Bennett

Dr Agnes Bennett was born in Sydney and graduated from Sydney University having studied science and receiving Honours. Not being able to study medicine in Australia she was accepted into medicine at the Edinburgh University, so she set sail to Scotland. In 1899 she graduated with Honours. Tragedy struck whilst at university when her fiancé drowned. She never married. On returning to Australia she had difficulty in gaining employment in hospitals as they didn't want to employ female doctors. For a short time she had a private practice which eventually closed because men would not allow their wives and daughters to see a female doctor.

In 1905 she went to New Zealand to soon become the Chief Medical Officer at St Helen's Maternity Hospital and Hon. Physician to the Children's Ward at the Wellington Hospital.

After being rejected by the AIF she set sail to France having volunteered for the French Red Cross. On the way her ship docked at Port Said (Egypt) where she saw rows of young, badly wounded men lying on the wharf, on stretchers, in the hot sun. She asked an orderly who they were and was told; They are ANZACS who have been wounded at Gallipoli, poor sods. There are no hospitals here. That was enough for Agnes, and she packed her bags and went down the gangway and found that there was only one young Doctor there. She said; I am a doctor, and you bloody well need me. Where do I start?

Having secured a storage shed as a makeshift hospital, she ordered soldiers who were acting as orderlies to move the men out of the sun. She set up an operating theatre and with little anaesthetic started to treat the wounded men. She worked for several days and nights and saved many lives. A British Officer arrived and said that she should not be doing this as only a doctor who was an Officer should treat wounded troops. She was much taller than the Officer and she said, well, make me a bloody Officer. The Officer went away and was soon back with the necessary papers which she signed and so became the first woman to become an Officer in the British Army. Captain Agnes Bennett RAMC now ordered that a train be found and that the wounded men be taken to Cairo Army Hospital and that she would go with them. She then obtained a leather Sam Brown belt and gun holster and an officer's cap, she was now a surgeon and would take over the Cairo Hospital where she found overcrowded wards and men lying on stretchers in the corridors. The doctors and the staff were pleased to see that there was someone to put an end to the chaos. She also outranked them all. She was told that beds were in short supply and there were some coming in a few weeks. Not prepared to wait, she rounded up a group of fit soldiers and commandeered several army trucks and went to the harbour where there were several luxury ships moored. The men ripped out all their bunks and they made fine beds for the wounded men in

Cairo Hospital. Agnes remained at Cairo and ran a very efficient Hospital until the end of the Gallipoli Campaign.

After the Gallipoli Campaign Dr Bennett moved to Britian and served with the army's Millbank Hospital; here she met Dr Elsie Inglis who was forming the Scottish Women's Field Hospitals in France. She now joined the SWHs going to Edinburgh to raise her staff of high-spirited young girls who were keen to see some action. She took her hospital to the Serbian Front where she, Dr Cooper and Josephine Bedford joined up.

After the war Dr Bennett returned to Sydney but still was not accepted as a doctor, she returned to New Zealand and

worked once again at the Wellington Hospital. For a time in 1939 she also worked with the Flying Doctor Service in Australia and in 1940-42 she worked in Britian.

Her dedication and service was recognised by many countries through the awarding of the following: The Order of Saint Sava, The Order of The Redeemer, The Royal Red Cross of Valour, The Order of The Phoenix, The Polish Cross of Valour, The Polish Cross of Merit, and The Order of The British Empire.

Dr Bennett returned to New Zealand and passed away in Wellington on 27 November 1960, her heroism almost totally forgotten.

Dr Lilian Voilet Cooper and Mary Josephine Bedford

Lilian Cooper was born on 11 August 1861 at Chatham, Kent, England. Her father, Henry was a captain in the Royal Marines. From a young age Lilian had a desire to be a doctor. She entered the London School of Medicine for Women in 1886 and received a licence to practice in 1890. She had undertaken and passed examinations at the Royal College of Physicians, Edinburgh, the Royal College of Surgeons, Edinburgh and the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons, Glasgow.

Lilian moved to Brisbane in May 1891 accompanied by her companion Josephine Bedford, in response to an advertisement from Dr James Booth, becoming the first female doctor registered in Queensland. By the end of 1891 she had established her own surgery in the 'The Mansions' in George Street, Brisbane. She joined the Medical Society of Queensland in 1893 and later became an Honorary in the Hospital for Sick Children and the Lady Lamington Hospital. In 1905 she became associated with the Mater Hospital and remained connected for the rest of her life. Always seeking further knowledge Lilian spent time in America, earning a Doctorate of Medicine from the University of Durham. She was a Foundation Fellow of the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons and its first woman Fellow, having been admitted, on 19th June 1927, to Fellowship of the College of Surgeons of Australasia which became the Royal College. Her Fellowship Number is 128.

In 1904, she embarked on a new frontier – the world of motoring. Teaching herself to drive, she acquired her first car, a 7hp Oldsmobile. Dr Cooper was one of the first women to own a motorcar and in 1905 was the only woman included on the list of foundation members (18) of the Automobile Club (now known as RACQ). Her longest trip was a drive from Brisbane to Sydney and she made many trips into the country surrounding Brisbane. Although Lilian was clearly very skilled with her hands as a surgeon, she put them to good use undertaking her own home maintenance and motor vehicle repairs and maintenance. Josephine started driving in 1910, experience which she put to good use during her war service.

Lilian changed to a Renault in 1923 with a registration plate Q2689 and this became a symbol of her indomitable spirit and tireless pursuit of progress. Cruising through the streets of Brisbane, she embodied the essence of female empowerment, challenging stereotypes and leaving a lasting legacy for generations to come.

In 1915 she joined the SWH performing 12 months military service in Macedonia, where in 1917, King Peter I of Serbia awarded her the Serbian Order of St Sava, 4th Order, and Josephine was awarded the 5th Order of St Sava for their tireless work during the war. Lilian's exploits during the war are covered elsewhere in this article. Notably, her expertise was exemplified by the fact that of the 144 patients she operated on during her 8 months at the forward dressing station only 16 died. Remember this was under the most basic of conditions in an hospitable and dangerous environment.




FRONT AND SIDE VIEW OF ST. MARY'S.



She returned to Brisbane after the war and settled in Main Street, Kangaroo Point in a house called 'Old St Mary's' which she purchased in 1926. After Lilian's passing Josephine ensured that the home site was used for the development of the Mount Olivet Hospital (now St Vincent's Hospital) of the Sisters of Charity. Part of this hospital has since been named the Lilian Cooper Nursing Home. A visit to St Mary's Church of England Kangaroo Point provides visitors with beautiful images of memorial windows, one of which is dedicated to Lilian, and an altar at the front which displays embroidery of Dr Cooper's medal of St Sava.

Lilian died in her home on 18 August 1947, having retired in 1941. Lilian and Josephine, her lifelong friend, are buried together in Toowong Cemetery. Josephine passing on 22 December 1955.



What was the Scottish Women's Hospital (SWH)?

The SWH was conceived at a meeting of the Scottish Federation of Women's Suffrage Societies just a few days after the outbreak of the First World War. It was the brainchild of Dr Elsie Inglis and Frances Iven, who saw the war as an opportunity to demonstrate what women could achieve in medicine unaided by men. Prior to the First World War, women doctors were limited to positions linked to women's health, such as paediatrics, obstetrics and gynaecology, and few held consultant posts. The very first qualified Scottish female doctors played an active part during the First World War and with the exception of the work of Eileen Crofton there is little study of the association. The British War Office turned down the offer of association with the SWH and instead the SWH operated under the auspices of the French and Serbian Red Cross.

The Scottish Women's Hospital at Royaumont was under the direction of the French Red Cross and located at Royaumont Abbey. The hospital, a formed Cistercian abbey, was started by Dr. Frances Ivens and Dr. Elsie Maud Inglis. The doctors at Royaumont dealt with patients from the Western Front and undertook pioneering research on the use of X-ray technology able to diagnose gas gangrene infections earlier than bacteriological reports and before the presentation of symptoms. The work by Dr. Ivens and Dr. Savill at Royaumont was not referred to in subsequent work on the use of x-ray for the diagnosis of gas gangrene.






